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The Year in Review

Kansas Operation Lifesaver has had a busy year educating Kansas citizens. From January 1 to October 31st KS OL has made 1,100 presentations and have been at or hosted 54 special events. Each presentation and special event is a chance to educate and save a life. This year our amazing volunteers have been in contact with over 24,938 Kansas citizens, warning about the dangers of trespassing and the importance of rail safety. This is a 25% increase from last year.

KS OL has been out and about all over Kansas at car shows, festivals, children's events, trade shows, safety conferences, state and county fairs. And let's not forget our officers on the train, or those at positive enforcement lanes. All of these events make an impact and raise awareness.

This year KS OL has met with Kansans of all ages, making sure our message is heard by the young and old alike - especially by new drivers. Of the 11,047 Kansas residents to whom we gave presentations, 50% were drivers education classes. KS OL is equipping our next generation of drivers with the knowledge they need to Listen, Look, & Live!

Even before they begin driving, KS OL is educating the next generation that if they see tracks, think train. KS OL volunteers gave presentations to 8,173 children and teens of Kansas, focusing 74% of our volunteer efforts on the future of our State!

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
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Rail Safety Week Big Success

KS OL educates 1,881 Kansans, statewide in one week!

Rail Safety Week, September 22-28 was a great success we made direct contact with over 1,881 Kansas citizens. This is a thousand more than last year! In one week, KS OL hosted eleven presentations, was at six events including; a multi-force officer on the train event in Sedgwick County, a toy train show, a booth at a car show, and two positive enforcement lanes. KS OL was also on the news in Wichita and had PSAs running all week in the Topeka area.

Governor Approves Rail Safety Bill

SB 63 Became Law on July 1.

Motorists and pedestrians must now yield to on-track equipment the same way they would if a train were approaching. They will also be subject to the same fines and penalties.

The bill requires a driver to stop a vehicle at least 15 feet, but not more than 50 feet, before crossing a railroad track under certain circumstances if other on-track equipment, in addition to a railroad train as in continuing law, is nearby. The circumstances under which such a stop is required are the same as those for which a stop is required for a railroad train:

- A clearly visible electric or mechanical signal device gives warning of the approach of the train or other on-track equipment;
- A crossing gate is lowered, or a human flagman gives a signal that a train or on-track equipment is approaching or passing;
- The railroad train or on-track equipment approaching within approximately 1,500 feet emits a signal audible from such distance and is, by reason of speed or proximity, an immediate hazard; or
- The approaching railroad train or on-track equipment is plainly visible and is in hazardous proximity to such crossing.

Dangerous Crossings Near You?

To streamline our PSA's, volunteer efforts, signage, and other ways of reaching the general public KS OL needs your help.

Kansas has 4,675 miles of active tracks.

There are only five other states that have more tracks than KS.

KS has 7,382 at-grade, public, and private crossings

5,158 of these are public crossings

Only 1,860 crossings have gates

There are 14 Railroads in Kansas

Kansas Railways employ more 4,800 employees in KS

The first railroad in KS was built in 1859 and was 5 miles long

1859 is also the year the Topeka, & Santa Fe Railway was founded in Topeka
